On the Feasibility of Establishing Cooperative Ventures with Organizations on the U.S. Mainland in Promoting Hawaii and Its Products

Report on Resolution S.C.R. No. 68 S.D. 1 U.S. Mainland Organizations Promoting Hawaii and its Products

Introduction

The economy of the State of Hawaii is heavily based on tourism. There is a need to expand this industry and also to seek new areas to diversify the state's economy. The 2004 Hawaii State Legislature, through S.C.R. No. 68, S.D. 1 and S.C.R. No. 68, requested the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism, with the assistance of the Hawaii Tourism Authority (HTA), the Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau (HVCB), and the University of Hawaii (UH), to assess the feasibility of establishing cooperative ventures with U.S. Mainland-based organizations to promote Hawaii tourism, products and services, investment and business attraction.

This report researches the presence of Mainland-based organizations actively promoting Hawaii, its culture, products and services, natural resources, and various business activities. This report also provides a comprehensive assessment of contacts and serves as a source of information for future cultural, educational, social and business ventures on the Mainland. In addition, it considers the feasibility of financially supporting the efforts to these mainland based organizations.

The ability and willingness of Mainland-based Hawaii residents and their organizations to spread the Aloha Spirit and uniqueness of Hawaii to their new regions of residency represents a significant resource opportunity. Efforts to develop relationships with such organizations could benefit the Hawaii economy in the long run by establishing new and innovative methods of marketing the state, its products and services, nationally and internationally.

PART I: Overview of Mainland-Based Organizations Promoting Hawaii

Business Organizations

The Hawaii Chamber of Commerce of Northern California

The Hawaii Chamber of Commerce of Northern California (HCCNC) is a nonprofit, mutual benefit organization based in San Francisco, composed of volunteers and a board of directors. It is also an affiliate chamber of the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii. Founded in 1999, HCCNC has become an invaluable resource not only to DBEDT, but also to twenty-five businesses and

organizations located both in Hawaii and the San Francisco Bay Area. After only four years of service, HCCNC has a newsletter subscription list of close to 2000 individuals, in addition to their business clients. Additionally, HCCNC produces 4-5 events per year, which honor leaders of the Hawaii community in the Bay Area, hosts tailgates supporting the University of Hawaii, and spread the spirit, culture and commerce of Hawaii through quarterly networking events.

HCCNC and the internet organization, Global Pau Hana (GPH), offered a great deal of assistance to DBEDT during the "Hawaii- Open for Business" Silicon Valley Promotion in May, 2003 and in the Biotech Industry Organization's Annual Convention in San Francisco in June, 2004. They arranged meetings with local business leaders, assisted with public relations duties and granted DBEDT access to their mailing lists.

HCCNC has achieved the reputation as an organization that can successfully promote Hawaii commerce, community, culture and education in Northern California. The organization's volunteers have indicated that they would be willing to increase their efforts in order to carry out additional plans for future business opportunities, providing that funding from the State of Hawaii can be secured.

Global Pau Hana and Aloha World Ohana Lanai

The two most prominent internet-based networking groups currently in operation on the West Coast are the Global Pau Hana and Aloha World Ohana Lanai (AWOL). Both of these organizations serve as resources for Mainland and international individuals about Hawaii and the Hawaiian language; provide listings of upcoming events hosted by former Hawaii residents; and generate networks for former Hawaii residents in various cities. GPH has successfully created bases in many major cities on the mainland, as well as in Tokyo and Shanghai. GPH and AWOL are important databases for Hawaii-related recreational and business contacts alike.

Other Mainland-based Organizations

There are other mainland-based organizations similar to the HCCNC and GPH that are currently promoting Hawaii and the cultural, historical, economic development, educational and other aspects of the state throughout the country. Each is a non-profit association, comprised of volunteers who devote themselves to spreading the word about Hawaii. Whether through annual luaus, hula performances, educational workshops, community gatherings, or national publications, each of the following organizations has the ultimate goal of sharing their knowledge and love for Hawaii with the rest of the world. From California to New York, they have actively educated Mainlanders about Hawaii and promoted the special qualities of the state. It is essential that these organizations

be allowed to continue to flourish for they provide Hawaii with an informal marketing network in many different markets. By establishing cooperative and collaborative ventures with these associations, it is hoped that DBEDT can more successfully market Hawaii's tourism industry, and promote educational, business and investment opportunities in the state.

Educational Organizations

The Asian American Curriculum Project (AACP), Las Vegas Hawaiian Civic Club (LVHCC) and National Pacific Islander Educator Network (NPIEN) have established themselves as educational organizations that promote Hawaiian and Asian social issues through fundraising and scholarships. The eldest of these three associations, the AACP, offers educational materials on Asian issues and history to promote multiculturalism for schools and individuals alike. LVHCC grants educational scholarships to students of all races, but with a particular emphasis on those of Hawaiian ancestry or who are Hawaii-born. It also provides a discussion forum for economic, social, political and medical issues relating to Hawaiians. NPIEN has generated a network for educators who are either Pacific Islanders themselves or who teach Pacific Island students to identify existing needs and resources. As Hawaii is internationally known as a multicultural state, organizations promoting Asian and Pacific Islander relations and diversity can positively impact future cultural and business environments.

Cultural Organizations

The majority of Mainland-based organizations that promote the Hawaiian culture do so culturally, through hula classes, performances, luaus and annual festivals. These groups have proven integral in spreading the Aloha Spirit throughout the Mainland and the world. The Hawaii Cultural Foundation (HCF), the Hawaii State Organization of Washington, D. C., Hawaiian Community Center Association (HCCA), Hawaiian Community Center Organization (HCCO), Hawaiian Inter-Club Council of Southern California (HICCSC), Ke Po'okela Cultural Foundation, Pacific Islanders' Cultural Association (PICA), Na Mamo, nationwide hula halaus and college/university Hawaii Clubs are just a few of the various Mainland-based groups that are dedicated to spreading Hawaiian culture and commerce.

The Hawaii State Organization of Washington, D. C., in particular, is a valuable resource for Hawaiian culture in the Washington, D. C. area. In 1952, the organization became a member of the National Conference of State Societies (NCSS). Today, its membership has grown to include over 450 members and families. By hosting book readings, an annual Holoku Ball and numerous food

events, the organization has generated considerable support for Hawaii and its culture.

Publications

Organizations such as *Kapalakiko Productions Calendar of Hawaiian Events*, 'Ohana Magazine and Pacific Voices Talk Story (PVTS) feature events, stories or educational materials by and/for kama'aina. *Kapalakiko Productions Calendar of Hawaiian Events* has been exceptionally successful in establishing a loyal list of subscribers in the Northern California region. This quarterly publication advertises Hawaiian events such as local luaus, high-school and college reunions and community club gatherings all over the world. 'Ohana Magazine, circulated in 29 states, Canada, Europe and Japan, and PVTS, as a publication of Tui Communications, both share poems, stories and essays written by kama'aina. Journals and calendars such as these are invaluable resources not only for former Hawaii residents but also for anyone interested in marketing products or services to the overseas Hawaii community.

A Comprehensive listing of organizations can be found in Appendix A.

Part II: Results and evaluations of past promotional efforts involving Mainland-based organizations with DBEDT, HTA/HVCB, and UH.

In the past, State agencies and their contractors have utilized mainland based organizations which have relationships in Hawaii to coordinate events and to market and promote Hawaii. Following is an overview of the type of recent cooperative ventures that DBEDT, the HTA/HVCB and the UH have engaged in:

DBEDT: DBEDT has worked with the Hawaii Chamber of Commerce of Northern California (HCCNC) and the Global Pau Hana (GPH) on three occasions: in May, 2003 for its "Hawaii Open for Business" Silicon Valley promotion; in August, 2003 for its "Optical Sciences" promotion in San Diego; and in June, 2004 for its "Hawaii Life Sciences" San Francisco promotion.

The "Hawaii Open For Business" promotion was a coordinated effort between DBEDT, HVCB, the county economic development boards and economic development agencies, the University of Hawaii and the private sector to promote Hawaii as a center for science and technology, especially in the areas where Hawaii has a competitive advantage—astronomy, ocean and deep sea water resources, volcanology/geology, tropical agriculture, tropical disease research, dual use (military to commercial application), digital media, optical sciences. The promotion encompassed several events: a venture capital conference that was planned and funded by the HiBEAM (Hawaii Business and

Entrepreneurial Acceleration Mentors), targeted industry focus group forums, and a networking event. The overall goal of the event was to announce and provide information to the Silicon Valley/Palo Alto area that Hawaii was open for business, to engage the kamaaina/ex-pat population to help sell Hawaii as a place for business and investment, to identify possible investors or partners for Hawaii's companies or research activities, and recruit kamaaina for relocation back home to Hawaii. The HCCNC and GPH provided pro-bono services to DBEDT to secure necessary venues for some of the events, invite targeted individuals to the focus group forums, develop the networking program and guest list, and provide man-power during the events. The "Hawaii Open For Business" was a success in generating awareness and building relationships between the Hawaii ex-pats, DBEDT and its partners in the event, and resulted in several site visitations from prospective investors, including the Keiretsu Forum, an angel investor group with chapters in Northern and Southern California, who have now started a chapter in Hawaii. Additionally, DBEDT now has a contact list of 300 people to whom it can directly market to encourage business relocation, investment or to hold a meeting or convention in Hawaii.

DBEDT also worked with the Global Pau Hana San Diego and Orange County Chapters for its "Optical Sciences" promotion in San Diego in August, 2003. Again with its partners the county economic development boards and agencies, the UH and the private sector, DBEDT exhibited at the SPIE (Optical Science) Trade Show and held a networking reception for targeted optical and related sciences professionals and executives and the kamaaina in the area. Hawaii's presence at this trade show was instrumental in highlighting the state's optics technology capabilities and assets, and overall created a greater awareness of Hawaii's positive business environment and its viability as a place to do business, invest and/or hold business meetings and conferences. One specific outcome is that the UH Medical School is in discussions with a mainland firm about collaborating on a clinical trial in Hawaii for the company's new optical testing device for glucose. The Hawaii companies that participated reported that they made some excellent contacts, and one firm expected an increase in sales.

In June 2004, the state (DBEDT, University of Hawaii, economic development boards and private sector) participated in BIO 2004, the largest biotechnology event in the world, which this year attracted almost 17,000 people. DBEDT once again partnered with the HCCNC and Global Pau Hana network to assist in organizing and promoting a Hawaii Life Sciences Industry Forum and reception, which attracted 275 attendees. In fact, these events were promoted on the GPH web site and people were able to RSVP through the web site. This statewide effort to promote Hawaii's Life Sciences industry at BIO 2004 resulted in the following:

- July 2004 site visit by a Japanese biotech company interested in locating in Hawaii and presently conducting due diligence and feasibility analyses of setting up a Hawaii office
- An Israeli bio-tech firm will be submitting a proposal for joint research at the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii
- Industrial and environmental biotech scoping meeting will be held in Hawaii in September '04
- Potential Asia Pacific Industrial and Environmental Sector Conference September '05 in Honolulu
- Research collaboration between UH and Diversa Corp.
- Clinical Trial Agreements for Hawaii Firm

HTA/HVCB: The HVCB's CMI, travel trade, and PR/Promotions teams have worked with Hawaiian clubs and halau in the mainland to provide entertainment at events to promote the destination. These groups have been hired for road shows, travel trade shows, CMI trade shows, consumer travel shows, and PR/promotional events. The Hawaiian entertainment was used to enhance media exposure, provide entertainment to the people attending the events, and showcase part of the Island's culture through music and dance.

UH: The University of Hawaii has multiple, on-going relationships with mainland universities, research institutes, government agencies, private foundations and companies that result in hundreds of millions of dollars in research and training grants, and conferences in Hawaii as well as multiple inbound visits. UH has also partnered with DBEDT to attend the Bio conferences to promote the State to mainland-based organizations as well as to other mainland conferences and trade shows.

Direct and indirect results of these relationships and future projects that will utilize these relationships include:

- Hawaii recently designated as an EPSCoR state (one of 26 in the Union) and has recently been informed that it will host the annual EPSCoR conference in 2006 that is expected to bring well over 500 people to Hawaii. The EPSCoR rating helps bring in additional research monies that UH/the State is expected to match at 50%.
- The new John A. Burns School of Medicine, UH will be hosting a biomedical conference at the Honolulu Convention Center in January 2005. Current plans are for over 500 people to attend, including Nobel laureates who will speak, and venture capitalists, pharmaceutical companies and doctors and researchers from other states.

- An additional biomedical conference focusing on tropical infectious diseases is planned for March 2005 and expected to bring in over 60 leading researchers and specialists to Hawaii.
- UH's expansion in the life/medical sciences in the Kaka`ako area has attracted the interest of mainland property developers wanting to build research and other facilities for UH to use/lease. The Cancer Research Center of Hawaii (CRCH) is currently working on building a new comprehensive center with clinical facilities. A venture that will cost in excess of \$200 million. With the comprehensive designation from the National Cancer Institute and new, larger clinic, the CRCH will be able to attract the main pharmaceutical companies who will want to conduct trials in Hawaii. Based on the experience at other comprehensive-designated cancer research centers on the mainland, the CRCH could increase its research funding by hundreds of millions of dollars per year.
- In January 2005, the College of Business Administration (CBA) will once again host one of the World's Premier Conferences on Cutting-Edge Technologies, the Hawaii International Conference on System Sciences. The 37th Conference -- the largest to date -- was held January 5-8, 2004 at Hilton Waikoloa Village on the Big Island of Hawaii, attracting more than 700 computer researchers from universities, corporations, and government agencies throughout the world. HICSS-38 will be January 3-6, 2005, also at the Hilton Waikoloa, while HICSS-39 will be held on Kauai, January 3-6, 2006. The Conference currently considers research in nine areas or tracks, including Collaboration Systems and Technology, Complex Systems, Decision Technologies and Management, Digital Documents and Media, Emerging Technologies, Information Technology and Health Care, Internet and the Digital Economy, Organizational Systems and Technologies, and Software Technology.
- The Pacific Asia Center for Entrepreneurship and E-Business at the CBA brings in top guest speakers including venture capitalists from the west coast to speak and inspire students, faculty and the community. Through its efforts over the years, the CBA is now ranked in the top 20 business schools in the US for international business at the graduate level and top 10 at the undergraduate level. These rankings help attract new students and faculty from the mainland as well as internationally.

The University of Hawaii Alumni Association and the University of Hawaii Foundation are working hard at growing the database of alumni on the mainland and arranging regional activities around sporting events to bring them together and update them on what is happening at UH and in the State. An example of this was the UH Alumni Association Fresno Tailgate Event on November 12, 2004 when the Warriors played Fresno State.

Part III Recommendations for further cooperative ventures and projects:

DBEDT: DBEDT will continue to utilize mainland based organizations in the manner that it has in the past—for specific projects and events in targeted markets on as needed basis. Given DBEDT's limited marketing budget, this has proven to be the most strategic and cost effective way of cooperating with overseas organizations, and in engaging consultants or vendors for services. In practically all of its mainland based and overseas projects, depending on the scope and magnitude of the events, DBEDT seeks out organizations with Hawaii ties to assist in implementation, promotion and marketing, and general assistance. Help and assistance, except for out-of-pocket expenses, are usually provided on a complimentary basis by the mainland based organizations. This does not mean that DBEDT should continue to seek charity for worthwhile services provided by mainland based organization, and compensation should and will be considered on a case by case, budget by budget basis.

HVCB: HVCB's annual marketing plans are based on guidelines provided by the HTA. The plans allow for the same type of activity for CMI, travel trade, and PR/promotions that has occurred in the past, and HVCB will continue to work with Hawaiian clubs and halau in the mainland to provide entertainment at events to promote the destination.

UH: UH could work with DBEDT and the HTA/HVCB to attract more conferences to Hawaii in areas where Hawaii has research programs, as well as promoting sporting events that could use either the Universities facilities or those of other organizations in the State. With Herman Frazier being on the US Olympic committee, certain sports could be targeted to come to Hawaii to train ahead of the 2008 Olympics in Beijing, or simply to have their national tournaments here. Certain NCAA finals or play offs have been played here (specifically in volleyball) and others could be attracted. The UH sailing team is the current NCAA champion and so sailing regattas could be attracted. On the sporting front it is also recommended to plan ahead for possible world events that will be held in Asia and to attract teams taking part to train in Hawaii before going to the tournaments. A possible chance to attract international teams was lost during the last Soccer World Cup that was played in Japan and Korea. There is a possibility that the 2011 Rugby World Cup will be played in Japan, and if it is, Hawaii should market itself to international teams to train here ahead of time. As with DBEDT, UH has limited funds for marketing, but there are thousands of people who would come to conferences here at different times of the year, so an annual master plan and budget would need to be developed along with HTA/HVCB. We do need to work closer together to benefit the State in economic development and job creation (which also needs job training).

Part IV. Projected budget requirements for ventures and how monies would be expended:

Anticipated budgets for project-specific cooperative ventures would vary based on the scope and magnitude of the proposed event(s), and well as the scope and magnitude of assistance required from the mainland based organizations. Although both DBEDT and the UH attempt to do most of the organizing for its overseas events and activities (trade shows, trade missions, seminars, conferences, workshops, etc.) in house, it has on occasion contracted for "on the ground" services in the overseas market. These services are purchased on an "a la carte" basis and could cover a range of services from public relations, on-site manpower, mailing list development, sponsorship development, participant recruitment, logistics, venue design and decorating, entertainment, etc... Generally speaking, historical costs for Private Sector/DBEDT coordinated missions and trade shows have ranged from \$15,000 - \$75,000 which includes direct production expenses such as venue and trade show booth rental costs. These production expenses, to a large extent if not all, were borne by the private sector in sponsorship or participation fees.

HTA/HVCB's annual marketing plans are based on guidelines provided by the HTA. The plans allow for the same type of activity for CMI, travel trade, and PR/promotions that has occurred in the past, and HVCB will continue to work with Hawaiian clubs and halau in the mainland to provide entertainment at events to promote the destination.

Part V. Recommendations for implementation of a pilot program with a U.S. Mainland-based organization, such as the Hawaii Chamber of Commerce of Northern California:

In arriving at a recommendation, the report looked at two Scenarios for a pilot program with a mainland based organization:

Scenario 1: Representative Office

Concept: A full-time representative office in a targeted geographic market that would include, but not be limited to providing the following general services:

1) Get the Word Out

Disseminate key information about Hawaii events, conferences and opportunities to executives, individuals, businesses and organizations in the target market to promote travel, resources and business prospects.

2) Organize the Ohana

Create a comprehensive database of people in places of influence and leaders of community organizations with an interest in promoting Hawaii and its products, and provide means of linking parties with each other to effect business-to-business relations.

3) Concierge Hawaii

Create an informational resource for the State of Hawaii and the Mainland public.

4) Special Events

Organize and host year-round events that would directly promote Hawaii to large numbers of people and indirectly reach others through media sources.

Cost:

The budget for a representative office would include costs for management and staff, office and other overhead expenses, and direct project expenses. A reasonable estimate for such an office, depending on the targeted regional market, would be between \$150 - \$200k per year.

Comments and Conclusion:

While a "shared" representative office could be of value to several state agencies which are marketing to a common market, for example, the Bay Area which may be of interest to the HTA, DBEDT and the University of Hawaii, there are several challenges and limitations to this broad approach. Funding availability, strategic marketing plans, the type of services needed, and so forth, are some of the issues that need to be determined on an agency-by-agency basis. The upshot of which is whether a collaborative approach that engages an overseas organization to carry out the charges are necessary and affordable. This needs to be assessed against several factors including what marketing infrastructure and financial commitments are already in place for a particular market, how much more funding the agencies are willing to invest to support and sustain a higher presence, and a formula to determine each agency's pro-rata share of costs.

An overview of some of the challenges include the following:

- Some agencies, such as the HTA/HVCB, have already invested in certain markets and have in-region representation. Some markets, such as a Bay Area market, is already developed from a tourism standpoint so the benefits to be realized from a mainland based organization promoting Hawaii in the area would be minimal. Strategically, it makes more sense to invest in cooperative ventures with an organization in a market that is underserved or in a developmental stage.
- DBEDT's experience with full service representative out-of-state offices is that unless they are carefully structured, they tend to become servicing offices for part-time Hawaii residents or travel

- information centers, rather than serving as a trade and investment center. Although it may not be within the scope of the office's responsibilities, the staff will still need to respond to a vast range on "non-business and trade" inquiries in some manner through referral or research, thereby stretching further the already "thin" staff resources.
- Different agencies have different charges, and market definitions.
 Unless the return on investment for HTA/HVCB funding into a
 project, event or program is directly related to attracting visitors to
 the state, it is hard for the agency to justify the expenditures.
 Business marketing to the HTA/HVCB is generally defined as
 attracting business conferences, conventions and incentive
 meetings to Hawaii, where DBEDT defines business marketing in
 the broader sense of promoting Hawaii as a good place in which to
 invest and conduct business (including holding conventions and
 meetings).
- Developing and coordinating activities or events that meet different agency objectives and charges can be challenging. For example, an event that is both beneficial in attracting visitors to Hawaii and in promoting Hawaii's products and services could be passed over by the HTA/HVCB because there are other events or projects that can provide a higher return in meeting its charge to attract visitors to the State. Similarly, DBEDT could also pass on the project because there may be other, more effective programs to meet its trade and business development charge. Although agencies interests are complementary, they are different. The agencies need to be strategic in the dollars they expend to obtain maximum value for the investment made.
- Funding is always a major issue. Limited marketing monies means finding partners to help leverage funds. DBEDT's, with its tight marketing budget, is not only very strategic in its deployment of funds, but seeks ways to leverage its available resources, hence its partnerships in industry development and promotion with the county economic development boards and agencies, universities and the private sector. These partnerships generally come together for finite, specific projects.

Scenario 2: Contract for Individual Projects

Concept:

While the Representative Office concept is "horizontal" in nature, in that it covers a broad spectrum of services and industry areas, an alternative would be to "target" efforts to specific industries or events. Instead of funding being used primarily to administratively support an office, monies could be directed

towards solicitation for sponsorships, production and implementation costs, along with an agreed amount for administrative expenses. The budget essentially would be used for the sole purpose of an event or series of events directed at specific, targeted objectives. By requiring that the funds only be used in this manner, the contributing State agencies can better monitor the progress and leverage of its contributions, and better identify short-run and potential long-term benefits of this collaborative effort.

The primary goals of a Representative Office as described earlier: (to disseminate key information about Hawaii events, conferences and business opportunities; to organize and utilize human resources; and to serve as the primary event liaison for the Hawaii cause in the targeted region;) can be fulfilled to some extent as the planning for these specific events ensue.

Cost:

Budget would be determined on a project by project basis. Comments:

The State agency providing funding support would limit the use of the funds to a specific event, or series of events, as stipulated in a contract or letter of agreement.

The State agency would allocate appropriate State staff to liaise and collaborate with the contractor to effectively monitor the progress of event planning and implementation, and work with the contractor to find additional contributions from sponsors.

Recommended pilot project with a U.S. mainland based organization:

The recommended pilot project utilizes the overall concept of Scenario 2 as described above.

Given Hawaii's present high level of employment and rebounding economy, there is a need to attract qualified, skilled and able workers to Hawaii in practically all industry sectors. A pilot program that markets Hawaii as a place to live and work, and which targets a region with a large Hawaii ex-pat population, could help address this need for labor. A mainland based organization, with a large network of Hawaii ex-pats, with web-based and traditional communications infrastructure already in place, with experience in events production and promotion, with knowledge about various industry sectors in Hawaii (as well as the mainland region it is located in), with access to information regarding attracting ex-pats and new resident workers to Hawaii, would be the ideal type of organization to take on this pilot program. The

program could include seeking sponsors for and producing a large "Kamaaina Come Home" weekend festival event with Hawaii travel, cultural, entertainment and products activities to attract attendance, gain publicity and generate momentum in registering potential workers. The kick-off event would have to be sustained by follow through with potential employers as well as potential relocaters, records/resume keeping and update, and the development of a webbased means for potential employers and employees to communicate. This mainland based event could also be followed through with Hawaii based events such as the "Holiday Tech Fair", which is an annual event that brings Hawaii technology industry employer together with job seekers during the holiday season when ex-pats are back home visiting family and vacationing. Anticipated cost for such a pilot program could range between \$100-125,000, with private sector sponsorship picking up the tab for at least half of the cost.

The challenge still remains, however, for the different state agencies to come together to cooperatively find and develop value in the project that meets with their objectives, and commit to funding the program on a cooperative basis.

Part VI. Conclusion

The State of Hawaii can benefit from establishing cooperative relationships with numerous non-profit Mainland organizations devoted to promoting the various commercial and cultural assets of Hawaii. Utilizing the resources that these Mainland-based organizations have already established can generate and facilitate additional opportunities for Hawaii businesses. Hawaii's expatriate population has proven to be willing and excellent ambassadors for the State in many ways. Engaging these organizations is not only a cost effective means of implementing mainland projects and programs, but a way to coalesce and direct energy and talent that are knowledgeable about and responsive to Hawaii to open doors and make things happen. The challenge remains for State agencies to identify the targeted markets for promotions that they have in common and to determine if there are synergistic approaches to implementing their projects and activities, and the role that the mainland-based organizations can play, and if there are ways to coop funds and leverage budgets.

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Chamber of Commerce of Northern California is only one such organization on the U.S. mainland with ties to Hawaii and a commitment to promote commerce, community, culture, and education as it relates to Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, since such efforts would benefit the State of Hawaii, the State should develop ways to work with organizations with relationships in Hawaii that bring positive attention to Hawaii; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2004, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT), with the assistance of the Hawaii Tourism Authority (HTA), the Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau (HVCB), and the University of Hawaii (UH), are requested to study the feasibility of establishing cooperative ventures with U.S. mainland-based organizations for the purposes of promoting Hawaii and Hawaii products, including:

- (1) Information on U.S. mainland-based organizations with relationships in Hawaii that DBEDT, HTA, HVCB, and UH have worked with in efforts to promote Hawaii and its products, and the results of any cooperative ventures, including an evaluation of specific projects and programs;
- (2) Recommendations for further cooperative ventures that would provide the most return on any investment by the State, including recommendations for types of cooperative projects, such as tourism, business, development, events promoting UH sports activities, and others;
