

Public Health Confirms Measles Case in Los Angeles County On March 5th, 2025, a passenger arrived in Los Angeles International Airport from China Airlines flight CAL8/CI8 who is recently diagnosed with measles. Individuals who have been exposed are at risk for

symptoms, as the virus spreads through the air. As of March 6th of this year, there have been 222

measles cases in United States. In order to help prevent the risk for measles, it is important to stay up-todate with vaccines such as the measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine. **Local Detection of Hantavirus** In 2025, 7 mice were reported to be infected with hantavirus. Infection of hantavirus in humans is rare; however, people should avoid contact with wild rodents as there is no cure for the virus. "Wet cleaning" methods should be used to clean spaces where wild rodents are suspected, as this reduces the risk for

inhaling the hantavirus from the air. Symptoms of hantavirus include chills, headache, nausea, severe muscle aches, and difficulty breathing, and these typically develop 1 to 8 weeks from exposure. 
